By tradition, the first meeting of the year is the Annual General Meeting at which Officers are elected to serve for the coming year. Whilst comments and opinions on the operation of the OSSC are always welcome at any time, the AGM is an especially good time to air your views, suggest new directions, policies, or whatever. If you can possibly make it, please come to select the committee for next year – and tell them what they should be doing!

One of the items on the agenda will be the establishment of a Youth Program. Exactly what this would be and how it would work is to be decided, but I am pleased to say that Kim Scarrow has some ideas on this. Hopefully she will expand on these at the meeting.

An essential component of any Youth Program is to be able to provide a supply of free stamps to help kids get a start without too much commitment. So, using John Cortan's "Stamps for Kids" box as an inspiration, look through your heaps of unsorted minimum value material, fill a plastic bag (or two), and bring them along to the next meeting where they will be directed to the philatelists of tomorrow.

A "Full" member is entitled to propose motions, stand for

office, and vote at Club meetings, receives a copy of the Newsletter each month, and the Club's commission on selling stamps at the auctions is waived.

"Family Membership" is for people living at the same address. Each member of the "family" has all the rights and obligations of a full member except that only one copy of the Newsletter and other Club notices will be sent.

"Junior Membership" is for those under 16 on Jan.1st. Each "Junior" member has all the rights and obligations of a full member except that if a Junior member shares an address with a Full/Family member, only one copy of the Newsletter and other Club notices will be sent. If a Junior member does not share an address with a Full/Family member, then the Club will bear the cost of sending the Newsletter.

Apart from the above membership fees, all Club members and visitors are asked to continue contributing (presently 75ϕ) each meeting. This is passed directly to St. George's Church in appreciation for allowing us to use their room.


International News from our Northern Friends...

As promised in the December Newsletter, here are a few facts, figures and postal news from our friends who live on the 60th parallel at 20°E – Åland. Åland is politically a province of Finland, but has a very considerable degree of autonomy. It is an area in the Gulf of Bothnia, part of the Baltic Sea between Finland and Sweden. It consist of 6,500 islands, of which the smallest inhabited is Sottunga, with 130 people, a post office and a bank (but no banking machine). Mariehamn is the capital and seat of the government. The population speaks Swedish, but almost anybody is bilingual (sound familiar)? Since 1984 they have had their own postal services and maintain 21 post offices over the islands employing about 200 associates.. History has not always been very kind since their location in this strategic area has made them a football of neighbouring nations..

In the past they have issued between 12 and 15 new stamps each year with a face value of about Finnish Marks(FM) 79.00 (C\$ 20.00). The schedule for the year 2002 is again along the same lines, with the exception that the FM has been replaced by the Euro . On January 2nd 2002 they issued four new stamps. [Please note the quoted numbers are the official Åland reference numbers and have no relation to Scott].

162 "Transition to the Euro", shows a woman pushing a shopping card with a bright shinny Euro coin in it. The value is €0.60. For this occasion they also issued just 10,000 copies of a FDC with a numismatic first for them: a €1.00 coin included in the cover.

Also on the same date were two stamps released under the



series title of "Secretive Batrachians and Reptiles on Aland". #163 shows the Smooth Snake valued at €0.05 while the €0.70 #164 has a Great Crested Newt on the front. Both these animals are endangered species and a necessity for topical collectors of this genre.



The Åland flag is based on the Swedish one (gold cross on blue ground) with an additional red cross.

St Canute's Day is a special day in

Åland and Sweden where children go around to the doors of neighbours and others and are spoiled with sweets as they "tidy up after Christmas". This all goes back to a Danish King Knut who decreed that Christmas time was from December 13 (St. Lucia) till January 13 (Tjugondag Knut - St. Knut's Day). On January 2nd #165 valued at €2.00 was released portraying this children's event.

Close to the Mariehamn Airport, Åland Posten is building a brand new Post Terminal which will open at the end of February. To commemorate this event a stamp is planned for February 28 showing an artist's drawing of these new facilities. This €1.00 stamp is #166.

Issue No. 167 is a booklet of 2 x 4 stamps depicting typical Åland dishes. The booklet is called Bon Appetit and shows salmon, Baltic herring, beetroots, black bread and pancakes and has a total face value of appr. ϵ 8.80 (not exactly known since they carry a value only marked as 1st Klass and no denomination).

Nordic Contemporary Art, together with the Europa Circus common issue, will see the light of day on May 3rd followed by four more issues on August 12, September 2, and October 9.

The last one is number 15 of a continuing series which started in 1988 and shows Churches of Åland. I will try to get them all as a Topical display for the show. For topical collectors here is some food for thought: endangered species, folklore, euro, architecture and gourmet dishes.

For the mathematically inclined a small footnote. The Finnish Mark was pegged to the Euro on January 1999 as $\,\epsilon$ 1.00 equals FM 5.94573, That is why an old stamp showing FM 2.70 also showed $\,\epsilon$ 0.45 (2.70 divided by 5.59573).

Keep on watching our International News from the above 60 countries. For February we will focus on a community of app. 45.000 people living on 18 rocky islands in the middle of the North Atlantic. A country called the Faroe Islands, partially Danish but with a rich heritage in surviving on these islands. Also a rich variety in philatelic experience.

Survey Response

Lin getting circuit books relevant to your interests (and budgets). So far 12 response have been received and hopefully more will come yet.

The preliminary results indicate that almost all members do

like looking through circuit books at our monthly meetings and most also said they would like to use the circuits to sell stamps as well as buy them.

Furthermore, half the respondents said that they would be prepared to pay more than \$5 for a single stamp and would not

feel uncomfortable spending over \$10 in an evening. No-one said they felt limited to less than \$1 for a stamp or \$5 in total.

As far as interests go, all but one person collected Canada and most had other interests – which pretty well covered the rest of the world.

As it happens, Bob Pike was able to attend our December meeting and brought a selection of his Peninsula Circuit books. He would like to encourage people to use his circuit to sell stamps but pointed out that, in general, using a circuit to sell common stamps is really not worthwhile – if you have lots of domestic rate Canadian stamps or foreign rate foreign stamps, then it is probable that everyone looking at the circuit books has

them too. However, used US/foreign rate Canadian stamps could be worth putting in a circuit book (and could be a good place to find them too). Whilst Bob Pike would not suggest a minimum value for individual stamps or a completed book, it does make sense to leave out anything with a catalogue value of less than, say, 50¢. If you have material valued at less than that, maybe just offer it within the club, and for "base value" stamps, consider donating these to our "Stamps for Kids" box (p.1).

I do believe that with just the responses received so far we can select our books to better meet members requirements. However, if you haven't filled in a survey form yet, please do! I will have some at the next meeting for anyone who forgets.


