Next Club Meeting: March

March 2006

Some of you might remember a series of articles by Peter Broadfield ("Aussie Pete") about getting set up to use eBay to buy (and sell) stamps through the Internet. Well, a few weeks ago I took the plunge and tried my hand by putting in some bids. I have to say that, so far, everything has gone smoothly with the goods being delivered promptly and just as advertised.

Coincidentally, the latest *Canadian Stamp News* includes an article by Victor Wilson discussing the impact of eBay on stamp trading. Over the years Wilson has been using the service, he has found that prices for any particular item are pretty stable, that high-end pieces rarely sell, while collections and unsorted lots almost always do. He concludes by suggesting that stamp trading is as vigorous today as ever BUT the mechanisms for such trading are changing.

To my way of thinking, the biggest change that eBay is bringing to the stamp market is in the setting of prices. As I write this, there are some 800,000 stamp lots listed on eBay which include

Hi Bob,

Since you brought monetary items in last odds and sods. Here are two more:

Iceland: As of February 2nd, 2006 the AURAR designation on Icelandic stamps has disappeared. Thus the value will be expressed as 50 instead of 50.00. This is a result of Government directives which took effect October 1st, 2003. Coins in values of 5, 10 & 15 Aurars, are rendered invalid from that day onwards (1 Island Krona was 100 Aurars).

Denmark. In the article about the wavy line definitives of Denmark (October 2005), I mentioned that, since they were introduced in 1905, they were the second oldest running definitives, only surpassed by the Norwegian's Post-horns issued in 1872. I took this from a Danish info brochure. The Danes are now eating their words. It appears that a Sudanese stamp issued on March 1st 1898 is the second oldest definitive and still used as recently as in 2003. Its the one with the vignette of a postman on a camel (Scott# 9/16), which makes Denmark's the third oldest.

Looking further at the Bluenoses, closing prices for used examples seem to be generally \$10-20 – which suggests that the 2002 Unitrade value of \$45 (fine) and \$90 (very fine) is rather more than a bit optimistic.

Stamp of the Month...

Seeing as Charles mentioned it, here is the design used for the second longest running definitive. It really is a fine design and, to my mind, it is way more interesting than either the Norwegian "post-horn" or the Danish "wavy line" definitives.

As Charles says, the stamp first appeared in 1898 and was based on a drawing by one Captain E. A. Stanton who was a surveyor/cartographer working for the British Army in Sudan at the time. Stanton had created something of a reputation for

"illustrating" his maps with pen-and-ink sketches of oases, wells, and other points of interest and this brought him to the attention of Lord Kitchener, governor of the region. Kitchener gave Stanton five days to come up with a stamp design and the "Camel Postman" was the result. Actually, the model was a sheik with whom Stanton was acquainted who was persuaded to don war kit (rifle and spears) and ride his camel through the desert with saddle bags stuffed with straw.

The resulting image has become an icon representing Sudan on stamps, banknotes and coins for over a century.



What's New... Charles van Rompu

inn's World Stamp Almanac Millennium Edition, issued in 2000, lists the following stamp issuing entities in the Caribbean as "Active":

Anguilla (1967-). A small island in the Caribbean, formerly attached to St. Kitts – Nevis – Anguilla. British control reestablished in 1971.

Antigua (1862-). Situated in the Eastern Caribbean S.E. of Puerto Rico. Became the independent state of Antigua-Barbuda in 1981.

Aruba (1986-). Southernmost of the Islands of the Netherlands Antilles, situated east of Curação N. of Venezuela. Has issued its own stamps since 1986.

Bahamas (1859-). 700 Islands and 2,000 islets in the Atlantic Ocean. British since 1647. Independent 1973. Banking and tourism are the main resources.

Barbados (1852-). British Colony until independence in 1966.

Barbuda (1922,1968-). Small island in the Leeward group in the West Indies. Barbuda is a dependency of Antigua.

Bequia (1976-) Nearest neighbour of St Vincent. N. of Trinidad and S. America. Followed the stamp issue proliferation trend set by the Grenadines of St. Vincent.

Bermuda (1948-). Island group in West Central Atlantic Ocean. British colony since 1609. Was granted internal self-government in 1968. In a 1995 referendum, voters chose to retain their colonial status.

British Virgin Islands (1866-). Eastern part of the Virgin Islands group of the West Indies SE. of Puerto Rico. The 30 eastern islands were under Dutch control until 1666, when they passed to Britain. Until 1956, they were administered as part of the Leeward Islands colony. In 1956 they became a crown colony and, in 1967, an Associated State.

Caicos Islands (1981-). Northwestern most six principal islands of the Turks and Caicos Islands. Stamps overprinted "Caicos Islands" appeared in mid 1981 followed by purpose-inscribed issues in 1983.

Canouan Island (1976-). Part of St Vincent-Grenadines.

Cayman Islands (1901-). Three Islands in the Caribbean, NW of Jamaica. British colony. Since 1970, the Cayman Islands have became a tax-free haven for banking.

Cuba (1855-). The largest island of the West Indies, located south of Florida. Under Spanish rule from 1511-1898, when the Spanish-American War resulted in the U.S. assuming trusteeship of the island. An independent Cuban republic was formed in 1902. In 1959, the repressive Batista government was overthrown and replaced by the Communist regime of Fidel Castro.

Dominica (1874-). Dominica was a British Crown colony 1833-1968, an Associated State 1968-1978, and became independent in 1978.

Dominican Republic (1865-). Occupies two-thirds of the Island of Hispaniola. Enjoys relative stability and economic progress since 1966.

Grenada (1861-). British Colony until independence in 1974.

Grenada-Grenadines (1973-). A small group of Islands administered by Grenada. Since 1973 Grenada has issued more than 2,000 different stamps of the Grenadines.

Haiti (1881-). Politically still very chaotic.

Jamaica (1860-). Discovered by Columbus in 1494, under Spanish rule till 1655, became independent August 6th 1962.

Mayreau Island (1976-). One of the St Vincent Grenadines.

Montserrat (1876-). An island in the Leeward group in the West Indies. A separate crown colony.

Mustique Island (1976-). One of the St Vincent Grenadines.

Netherlands Antilles (1873-). Consists of Curaçao, Bonaire, Saba, St Eustatius and St. Maarten (the later shared with France (Saint Martin)). They were originally occupied by Spain, but were under Dutch colonial control since 1634. In 1954 they were made an integral part of the Kingdom of the Netherlands.

Nevis. (1861-1890, 1980-). One of the Leeward Islands. From 1890 to 1956 stamps of the Leeward Islands were used. Issues of St. Kitts-Nevis were also used 1903-1952 and replaced by St Christopher-Nevis –Anguilla, issues after 1952. Nevis again started to issue its own stamps in 1980. In 1983 it became independent in a federation with St. Kitts, but still issues its own stamps.

St. Kitts (1980-). As St. Christopher, St. Kitts used its own stamps from 1870-1890. These were replaced by general Leeward Islands issues from 1890 till 1956, which were used concurrently with stamps inscribed "St.Nevis" 1903-1952 and "St. Christopher-Nevis Anguilla" 1952-1980. St Kitts is an associated state in the British Commonwealth, federated with Nevis but maintaining its own stamp issues since 1980.

St. Lucia (1860-). British Colony until independence in 1979.

St.Vincent (1861-). British Colony until independence in 1979.

St. Vincent-Grenadines (1973-). A small group of islands administered by St Vincent, including: Bequia, Mustique, Canouan and Union Island. A host of expensive topical issues were produced for the Grenadines, Bequia and Union Island during 1984-1988, almost exclusively for collectors.

Trinidad and Tobago (1913-). British Colony until independence in 1962. One of the most prosperous of the Caribbean states.

Turks & Caicos Islands (1900-). British Crown colony.

Union Island (1976-). Southern-most significant island of the St. Vincent-Grenadines.

The foregoing is only a listing of active stamp issuing states in the Caribbean and West Indies, to which I added the Bahamas and Bermuda. It should be realized that in the past many more states issued stamps such as **Martinique** and **Guadeloupe**, which places are now using the stamps from France. I hope that this listing may be helpful in your search for stamps for the display in our show in May. Hope to see you on March 15th .

From the Internet ...




