Hi Hank

There are several ways of solving this problem with varying degrees of success. The first is getting out to visit larger clubs with their own Sales Circuit they usually have a fairly good selection of more modern issues. You can also invite them to bring their Circuit books to your own meetings some of them will do that.

Secondly there is the option of having your club by some kiloware (stamps on paper) and selling them to members for perhaps .25 cents each or you can buy them yourself and sell what you don't need. Kiloware is usually advertised for sale in your philatelic papers.

The third option is to get permission from your local Post Offices to place a container on their counter to allow people to put their stamps from parcels and letters in.

The container should be about 4-8 liters in size with an attached lid and a label stating that the stamps are used by your club to help promote the hobby and also putting club contact info in case of questions and someone for juniors to contact and have stamps available to give them. I personally know of a club that gets quite a selection of stamps from such a venture, as well as being asked about disposal of collections with some donated to the club. Hope this helps keep you away from the Black Market

Stamp on Envelope...

Royal Architectural Institute of Canada: 100th Anniversary

For the second time in my short career as your editor our mailing day is the first day of issue for our stamp on the envelope. This interesting set of four domestic rate stamps represents four impressive Canadian buildings and their architects. Each of the architects has received the gold medal award from the Institute and the honour of the Order of Canada. The stamps are in a pane of eight stamps, arranged in four rows of two. Each variety has a limited colour motif which continues into the selvages both sides. On the right is a portrait of the architect and on the left appears to be one of the original sketches for the building.

The first stamp depicts the University of Lethbridge by Arthur Erickson, 1971. The view shown expresses how the University fits into it's environment. Although that is a good concept, I'm afraid that in the tiny format of the stamp we lose any real sense of the building at all. Second is St. Mary's Church by Douglas Cardinal, 1969. Where is this church? I don't know, the information is not given. I know that Lethbridge is in Manitoba, so I have a pretty good idea where that building is. The portrayal of the church is an evocative, almost haunting silhouette of the building. I like it. The third building is the Ontario Science Centre by Raymond Moriyama, 1969. The photograph has a nice composition but the close up view of the building fails to leave me with the impressive sense of awe that we all felt as kids on our first school trip to visit the Science Centre. The National Gallery of Canada by Moshe Safdie, 1988 is the fourth building represented. This shot has a dynamic composition from an angle that allows you to feel that you're just approaching it and that there is more to discover. Well done. I think this structure is in Ottawa, but the article doesn't mention that either.

Maybe I should put three or four stamps on each envelope so we can all have more modern used Canadian stamps. Just kidding!
