# From Dr. Phil A. Telly...

Stamps got you licked? Feeling stamped out? Don't worry. Don't let it get you down, Dr. Phil A. Telly has come to town!

#### Dear Dr. Phil,

I read your column last month about the Allied Military stamps from Germany. I agree that cataloguing German stamps can be a headache but they are always fascinating. One of the first things that really strikes anybody starting to collect German stamps are the issues surcharged with higher and higher values. The rates on the stamps start at a few pfennigs then abruptly go up to a few thousand marks and the next thing you know, some are surcharged with millions of marks! What's with that??? Shocked at prices!









## Dear Shocked,

The German Inflation period started slowly about 1921 but the worst started in 1922 and came to a head at the end of 1923. All of this was a result of world conditions following WWI and Germany's huge war reparations debt which quickly became unmanageable as inflation increased. This would all be eased at the end of 1923 with a 200 million dollar loan from the U.S.

Inflation increased gradually until Aug. 1923 after which rates in increased as much as five fold in one week and by year end rates as high as trillions of Marks were not uncommon. The German Post office failed to keep up with the need for new issues of the new rates and started to reuse old stamp dies and simply reprint them with new values overprinted on them and with the rapid rate changes there were quite a few printed.

After the inflation period there were many leftover mint stamps with the overprints and certain unscrupulous individuals acquired these. Because of the short usage period, used examples on some of these stamps became slightly more valuable whereas mint were plentiful so worth little. This of course inspired these individuals to have these stamps cancelled to take advantage of the better price for used stamps. This is the reason that any stamp being claimed as used, especially higher values, should be expertised if you are buying them; otherwise a large reduction in price is called for.

For those of you looking for a challenge, a collection of these stamps on cover showing the proper rate at the proper time would be very interesting when you consider rates changed as often as daily towards the end of 1923 some of these could be very hard to find.

Well I kept to the basics I hope I've helped your dilemma. One last little tidbit; in 1923 the price of a loaf of bread in Germany was 300,000,000 yes 300 billion marks! So take a valium and call me in the morning (ha ha)
