Mount Hurd...By Bob Graham

Canada's stamp issue of 1928–29 is known to collectors as the Scroll Issue. It was distinctly innovative for at least two reasons. Unlike previous definitive series, the portrait of the reigning monarch is restricted to the lower denominations, up to 8 cents, while higher denomination stamps are pictorials, showcasing different regions of the country. The balance between royal portraits and pictorials for definitive series pioneered in 1928–29 was so successful that it was retained, with slight variations, through to the end of the Centennial series in 1967. It is also the first regular series of stamps to have fully bilingual text.

Best known in the Scroll Issue is the splendid 50 cent Bluenose, which has been claimed to be the world's most beautiful stamp. The 10 cent stamp in the series, while forever overshadowed by the Bluenose, also merits admiration.



Canada 10¢ "Mount Hurd"

The 10 cent stamp was selected to represent British Columbia, and features a spectacular mountain. Mount Hurd is located in eastern British Columbia, near the Alberta border, just off the Trans-Canada Highway, about 8 km from the village of Field. It lies south of the confluence of the Ottertail and Kicking Horse Rivers. The mountain was named in 1904 after Major Marshall Hurd. An American Civil War veteran, Hurd

assisted Major A. B. Rogers in locating the best route for the Canadian Pacific Railway through the Selkirk Mountains, which became known as Rogers Pass. In 1886, Canadian Pacific Railway management began to offer free rail passes to

artists who would create pictures of scenery, in an effort to stir interest in

His rising fame brought him to the attention of Princess Louise, wife of former Governor-General the Marquis of Lorne, and her recommendation in turn led to the opportunity to paint a portrait of Queen Victoria. That

Bell-Smith's original *Ice Crowned Monarch of the Rockies*, a 28x36 inch

honour was accorded to very few artists. The Queen is said to have been pleased with the portrait.



Mount Hurd was one of five classic Canadian stamps honoured in a set marking the Entitled "Ice-Crowned Monarch of the Rockies", Bell-Smith's watercolour painting of Mount Hurd, created on a trip to the Rockies in 1891, was chosen for the 1928 stamp. Elements in the picture were moved around by the artist to produce the best visual effect, and no precise spot exists from which it can be said

the picture was painted. Two riders on horseback are clearly seen in the painting as they approach a river at the bottom of the valley in the foreground. They are still present on the stamp but are so reduced that one almost needs a magnifying glass to see them. The owner of the painting at the time, Mr. R.

D. Hume of Toronto, lent it to the Government for the purpose of copying it on the stamp.

The stamp was designed by Herman Herbert Schwartz and engraved by Robert Savage, one of the finest American picture engravers of the twentieth century. A totem pole is seen in each end panel, framing the mountain. At first these seem incongruous, as the totem poles were erected by coastal tribes. If it is recalled that the stamp was meant to represent British Columbia to all Canadians, their presence makes a little more sense.

The next definitive series also included a pictorial stamp featuring a majestic mountain - but that's another story for another time.

OSSC Newsletter December 2011 On the Cover...Holiday Stamps of 2011



It has been a tradition of Canada Post in recent years to produce four stamps for the Christmas season. Three stamps are of one theme and the other stamp is completely different. They are all Christmas stamps but some have a religious theme and some reflect other aspects of Christmas and winter. The religious and secular stamps alternate

each year being presented in a set of three.

This year's secular stamp is represented by an image of holly. It is the fourth in a series of single secular stamps issued every other year since 2005. The set includes the snowman, the reindeer, the Christmas tree and continues with the new holly stamp. The images from these stamps have been made into Christmas cards and are available in a set of twelve along with a booklet of twelve holly stamps for \$15.95.

The religious Christmas stamps this year depict aspects of the stained glass windows from the Cathedral of Saint Mary of the Immaculate Conception in Kingston. The Cathedral is approaching a century and a half in age. Its magnificent stained glass windows were made in England and shipped to the USA. The Americans refused to release the windows to Archbishop Cleary until duty was paid. Offended by this, the Archbishop spoke to Sir John A. MacDonald who managed to get the windows shipped. Were the duties ever paid? Apparently nobody knows!

Saint Mary's has several very large windows that encircle the building. Each of these huge windows is made up of a number of stained glass panels. The carved stone tracery that supports each panel may appear delicate from afar but it is carefully designed to be quite strong to support the heavy panels. In this Cathedral the windows down each side are made up of two tiers of three lancet shaped panels surmounted by the apex panels which fill space above the lancets to give the whole window a lancet shape. Each of the six lancet panels (in the two tiers) has a central area that depicts stories from the Bible. The rest of the panel is filled with elaborate floral patterns painted on in geometric formations.

The first two windows tell stories from the Old Testament. The third focuses on the life of Mary and the fourth moves on to tell of Christ's birth. This is where the images from our Christmas stamps have come from. Further windows tell the story of Christ's life.

The photos for the stamps were taken by Mark Thompson. Andrew Perro, the designer of the stamps has zoomed in on some central figures of the panel and

removed them from their original background to show them in front of the patterned floral areas from above or below the pictorial part of the panel. A beautiful example of the floral patterned areas is



shown on the cover of the three booklets and across the top of the souvenir sheet. The figures that Perro has detailed are: the Angel who appeared to Joseph is on the 'permanent' rate stamp, the Nativity scene on the US rate stamp and the international stamp shows the visit of the Magi.

The OFDC is cancelled in Kingston of course. The cancellation is in the form of one of the round floral patterns. The only OFDC available bears the lovely souvenir sheet. If you want to get all of the stained

glass stamp products you'll have to order the 'gutter product' which is the American rate booklet attached to the international rate booklet.
