### **Club Update**

There are several things to bring to everyone's attention. The newsletter serves as an important communications device, but since the retiring of our last editor, it has been difficult to keep this tool going. The original hope was that the Owen Sound website would be available to help with communication and reduce the mailing cost of the newsletter. This consideration was necessary with the massive increase in postage for an ordinary letter, and as a reminder that the cost of postage increased from \$0.63 to \$0.85 per letter on March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2014. The website project has been less than what was expected, but the free creation convinced us to proceed. The website is up and running, but contains errors which the creators haven't fixed. A recent email from the creators has given me some hope to have the website redesigned and free of errors.

The Owen Sound Club Circuit books are now in operation. Chris Tschirhart has several binders full of pages submitted by club members (see Chris's update on the circuit books further in the newsletter). There are many pages of Canadian stamps and more pages are coming from worldwide countries. The number of books/binders is small for the moment, but it is a beginning. Please take some time to submit pages of your extra stock of stamps that are just lying around gathering dust. Please remember that the stamps you put on pages are the same quality that you would like to see in your own collection. It is planned that the Owen Sound books will be attending the GRVPA Club Circuit Book Fair in Cambridge later this October.

At the recent RPSC Royal convention held in London, I had the opportunity to meet with Vera Felts, the person who is the administrator of the American Topical Association (ATA). I am already a member of the Association and it was an also a chance for a few other club members to join when we travelled there a couple of months ago. Vera shared with me that the ATA has a library of DVD's on topical stamp collecting. These DVD are available for clubs or members to purchase. If a club was to purchase several different subjects, there was a discount available for doing so. If we were to buy about 15 different DVD topics, the price for purchase is \$5 (US) per DVD plus shipping. This price is half of what a single purchase would be, so it is a significant saving for a club and it may stimulate a new collecting sideline at a later date when you run into a wall with your main collection. A motion was passed at the last meeting in June that I seek a joint purchase with the Saugeen Club and Kincardine Club for this library. The Saugeen Stamp Club met on July 7<sup>th</sup> and has approved in principal the participation of this purchase. The details are to be worked out between the three Presidents.

As mentioned earlier in the President's message, the newsletter is without a full time editor. At our meeting last month, Bill Findlay suggested that the three area clubs do a joint newsletter. The Saugeen club has approved the concept but a further study is needed for how each club will participate in the newsletter as well as the splitting of costs. Basically, the current Saugeen newsletter can be mailed for the common postage of a single letter, but with additional pages for the other two clubs (Owen Sound and Kincardine), the ordinary postage is not enough and so oversized envelopes and additional postage eats into the cost effectiveness of this communications. My personal opinion is that the newsletter is a communication device about our hobby, a tool to help each individual learn more about stamp collecting and the fascinating world revealed to us through stamps. In its current format, the Saugeen newsletter has slipped from my expectations of a newsletter and so I would like to see more discussion at our next meeting concerning the role of a newsletter and if we should proceed with a common newsletter with the two other clubs.

#### A Nephric Ode to the Souvenir Sheet

As a more recent returnee to the hobby of collecting Canadian Stamps after an absence of twenty eight years, I had a lot of catching up to do. I was pleased at some of the art work of many of the stamps I had missed over the years. One of the things that blew me away was how the souvenir sheet had grown in volume and prevalence over the years. When I last collected stamps, the only Souvenir Sheets issued were associated with the CAPEX exhibitions. I, being a bit old fashioned, feel that there are now too many of these sheets being produced with no rhyme or reason as to the criteria to have a sheet.

To be a bit honest I have left the sheets to the end of my catch up in trying to update my collection because, in many ways I don't like them, and find a lot of them unnecessary! I also find it unnecessary to have a duplicate souvenir sheet of stamps that are issued as singles also. To give an example of a sheet that seems so out of place to me is the Circus Clown Souvenir Sheet (Unitrade #1760b) issued in 1998. This is perhaps a blatant example of Canada Post trying to line its pockets by firmly putting a fish hook in the collectors' mouths.

I agree with the CAPEX original example for a souvenir sheet, but Clowns! Stamps often are about a nation's Sovereigns, leaders, achievements, accomplishments, and history. As a lifelong student of Canadian history I can recall no clowns being present in Newfoundland with Jacques Cartier, Champlain entering Huronia, Vancouver sailing up our West Coast, Martin Frobisher sailing into his Bay, or Alexander McKenzie trekking across Canada. I may defer from time to time regarding certain Parliamentarian's however! On the other hand I am in agreement with the sheet of all the Maple trees across Canada. To me such parts of the fabric of Canada make sense to me.

I would make the case that there should be a set of criteria to have these sheets considered by Canada Post. My suggestion for a list of criteria for sheets area as follows:

- 1 Capex Sheets;
- 2 A co-issue of stamps issued by Canada and another Country to mark an event in both our Histories;
- 3 Hundred Year Anniversaries of events in our History;
- 4 Heraldry, Symbols, emblems, and representative animals and fauna in Canada;
- 5 Technological Accomplishments;
- 6 Important Historical Figures.

Even with this list the opportunity to pummel us the collector with Souvenir sheets still presents ample opportunity to reach deeply into the collectors pockets. I offer these opinions to garner the thoughts of other club members. Thank you

#### Another stamp error?

On Friday, July 3<sup>rd</sup>, Canada Post released a series of five stamps featuring five UNESCO World Heritage Sites in Canada. This new release is a continuation of the series released last year about UNESCO World Heritage Sites in Canada. There were five stamps released last year for personal letters on March 31<sup>st</sup> and on May 16<sup>th</sup> a further set of five stamps to be used on mail destined for the United States and International addresses. The series this year consists of three stamps with a face value of \$1.20 and two stamps with a face value of \$2.50. These values would be used for mail heading to the United States (\$1.20) and International mail (\$2.50). As is the new policy, the stamps were released in the form of a mini-sheet with all five stamps on the sheet, and two booklets of six stamps each, one booklet for the US and the other for International mail. Undoubtedly there were also First Day Covers for each mail service as well as the mini-sheet.

The five sites featured on this year's series of stamps are the Dinosaur Provincial Park, Red Bay Basque Whaling













Station, Wood Buffalo National Park, Waterton Glacier International Peace Park and Kluane Glacier. The first three mentioned are on the stamps carrying the US mail postage rate while the last two mentioned are on the stamps carrying the International postage rate. The scan shows the booklet of the US postage rate. If anyone wants to purchase new stamps from Canada Post, the Canada Post website provides a phone number which will connect the caller to Antigonish N.S. distribution centre.

Although the series of stamps are artistically attractive, an error has occurred and so the subject of this short article. A search of the internet will provide pictures illustrated on the stamps. Canada Post discovered that the picture used for the Dinosaur Provincial Park **IS NOT** of the park itself. Consequently, the series of products containing the Dinosaur Provincial Park stamp has been withdrawn from the public. Is this another Seaway invert type of error? The US postage booklets and mini-sheets have been withdrawn from public sale. On checking the Canada Post website today (July 8<sup>th</sup>) only the booklet of the six stamps for International mail is available, no mini-sheet or US booklet are displayed as a product to be purchased.

I learned of this error when I visited the retail postal outlet on July 7<sup>th</sup> to mail some letters. The clerk excitedly shared the news that the UNESCO series of stamps had been withdrawn from public sale. Canada Post had sent an email that morning advising all post offices and retail outlets to withdraw the offending stamps from sale because the picture used on the stamp was not actually inside the park! Here arises the big question for all stamp collectors, how many booklets, mini-sheets and first day covers were sent out to customers of the philatelic service or purchased across the counter at the various outlets selling stamps? Is this series of stamps a collectable item? Will Canada Post redesign the offending stamp and put out another release later? Finally, will this error be recognized by the Unitrade catalogue?

Canada has tried very hard to limit errors in the philatelic material distributed to the public. Of course the Seaway invert is the most notorious and is an elusive stamp to find with a modest budget for stamp collecting, but reading through the Unitrade catalogue, there is a stamp company that will buy Canadian errors, mostly dealing with printing errors such as folded paper, missing colours, misperforated stamps etc. These are available for sale to collectors, probably trying to put together a display for the RPSC Royal show or simply to have the item in their collection.

The wrong picture error reminds me of another recent error made by the Post Office of Egypt, also this year. Due to my knowledge and interest in marine matters, there has been lots of news about the expansion of the Panama Canal but to a much lesser extent, news about the digging of a second Suez Canal. 2015 marks the opening of the second Suez Canal and so the Egyptian Post Office proudly issued a series of stamps to mark the event. Unfortunately for Egypt, one of the stamps shows the Miraflores locks from the Panama Canal as the entrance of the new Suez Canal! When this information became public, a search on eBay revealed people trying the sell a sheet of the incorrect stamp for \$500.

As a stamp collector, the Canada Post error means trying to get a copy of the Dinosaur National Park stamp for a collection. Now that the booklet has been withdrawn, it is going to be difficult to get a copy, never mind finding a used copy, which is most likely going somewhere in the United States. As a "purist" stamp collector, the used copy would be my interest in getting a copy of this error. And to the club members who now also know about the error, happy hunting!

#### **Owen Sound Stock Books**

I am pleased to update the club members on the status of the new Owen Sound Circuit Books. Over the past months, since just before Christmas, a number of members set out a set of rules to administrate a set of circuit books for the Owen Sound Stamp Club. As more stamps are contributed, binders and categories will increase. The basic premise of having our own books is to share our surplus stamps with other members of the club for purchase and the betterment of the Club. I have been a member of the Club for only a short time, and I have been grateful to the other Clubs who have attended our meetings to make their stock books available. Great Britain and the Commonwealth Binder including: England, Australia, Ceylon, South Africa (and Republic of), New Zealand, Hong Kong.

The Americas including: United States, Argentina, Brazil

'Topical' including Trains and Ships

Asia including: Japan, India, Indonesia, Pakistan, and Thailand

Europe (our largest Binder) including: Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Germany, Italy, Erie, Hungary, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Spain, Russia, Switzerland, and Sweden.

I would like to thank the five members of the Club who have contributed pages to the books so far. I am sure that other members have stock books of spares that would contribute to other member's collections if made available. So if you want to make a bit of money off your spares and help out your fellow Club members and the Club consider putting together pages for our stock books. If you need copies of the pages emailed to you please talk to me at the next meeting. Thank you.
